Making a Difference



Recycling lead from used car batteries is an important revenue source for poor communities in Vietnam. Researchers from DEOHS, in collaboration with the Vietnamese National Institute of Occupational and Environmental Health.

have found that children in these battery-recycling villages have high blood lead levels. Research Industrial Hygienist **Gerry Croteau** and Associate Professors **Catherine Karr** and **William Daniell** (all DEOHS) tested surface lead levels in Dong Mai village with Vietnamese colleague Nam, pictured, using an XRF elemental analyzer. The results will help researchers develop a lead remediation plan for the village. Funding for the work comes from Daniell's Rohm and Haas Professorship in Public Health Sciences.
