Day. Pam introduced environmental health and led a hands-on activity about dose-response. The students learned to use pipettes and were quick to recognize that a large dose of toxins in a small body (represented by 6 drops of blue food coloring in a 10ml beaker) would be really bad, Marilyn says. Pam and Heather told the 6th-8th graders how they became interested in science and encouraged them to follow their passions as they decide on a career.
