New Master's Program in Health Informatics



Health Services launched a unique master's program this fall designed to produce senior leaders in health informatics and

information management. The new <u>Master of Health Informatics and Health Information Management</u> (MHIHIM) is a two-year program believed to be a first, says Director and Senior Lecturer Gretchen Murphy (Health Services). It's unique because it partners faculty from the Health Informatics and Health Information Management program with faculty from the Executive MHA program, she says. The current students range from about 23 years of age to more than 50.
